- impact of new feedstuffs and additives on animal health and product quality
- feed components improving animal health
- feeding animals to produce functional foods for humans
- the control and reduction of feed contaminants and carryover from feed to food
- better methods for identification and monitoring of contaminants

Session 1. Role of food for health of the elderly

- Milk proteins and sarcopenia
- Vitamin D rediscovery – its role in healthy aging, new information
- Role of milk in reduction of chronic disease
- Long chain n-3 fatty acids from seafood: their role in improving health and quality of life and the sustainability of their supply
